## We've Come A Long Way

'Traditional' special education teacher programs prepare close to <u>20,000</u> <u>candidates</u> yearly (USDOE, 2023) Thousands of highly skilled researchers in the special education research community, with more graduating each year

Thousands of peerreviewed articles published in scores of journals that span areas within special education each year Many millions of dollars is awarded annually to researchers to conduct high-quality research in special education.

Strong advocacy efforts from organizations like CEC, TED, HECSE





## **But There Is Still A Long Way To Go**

- Shortage of special education teachers, significant (~15%) turnover, and lack of diversity in our workforce (Bettini & Gilmour, 2024)
- Research agenda setting and grant allocation are not democratic
- Researchers work in relative isolation with little to no collaboration field wide
- We know some about what works, but have made little progress on what works for whom, in what settings, for what outcomes
- Most journals owned by publishers that make huge profits based on the (largely) unpaid work of scholars as authors, editors, and reviewers
- Most published research is behind paywalls, inaccessible to practitioners, families, and many scholars





## **Potential Changing Landscape**

#### Restructuring Federal Oversight

 Shifts in responsibilities for education programs, such as IDEA, to agencies outside the Department of Education

### Changes to Federal Funding

- Title One funding directed to families through alternative mechanisms (e.g., savings accounts)
- Elimination of competitive grant funding programs

## Accountability and Oversight Concerns

 Potential for fragmented oversight with diminished ability to enforce IDEA requirements effectively





## The Field Has Been Here Before

#### Deinstitutionalization

• Willowbrook: Robert F. Kennedy's 1965 visit and report exposed the inhumane conditions, galvanizing public support for reform and community-based care.

## Securing Access to Education

 Burton Blatt and Elizabeth Boggs worked to shape policies and legislation that laid the foundation for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)

## Advancing Employment Protections

 ADA Advocacy: Ed Roberts led efforts to secure workplace protections and accessibility for people with disabilities

## **For-Profit Publishers**









- A soon-to-launch diamond open-access of, by, and for special education researchers
  - Everything will be open at no cost to authors
  - With support from UVA library
- Will recognize and support open practices
- Can engage in **innovative practices** 
  - Anonymously publishing peer reviews
  - "Pay" reviewers
  - Mentor early career researchers in review process





## **TED and Aletheia Publication Partnership**

- Let's lead a transformative shift in publishing research and practitioner papers for broader access and impact
  - Build on the success of the *Journal of Special Education Preparation*
  - Establish a dedicated teacher preparation section in *RiSE*
  - Support existing open-access journals and encourage pre and post printing
  - Encourage the development of new open-access journals for special education research
  - Prioritize publishing your work so its accessible to all





## Making Way on the Two-Way Street

- Open Access and Practitioner Friendly Journals can facilitate...
  - "Equal and Critical Partners"
  - Translation of research to practice
    - "Effective Core of Interventions" (Heward, 2023)
    - Must move from the core to "consistent delivery & adaptation of interventions that are EFFECTIVE, EFFICIENT, SUSTAINABLE" (Belfiore & Lee, 2024)
  - Practitioners access (physically) AND are they accessible (social validity)





# Crowdsourcing and the Special Education Research Accelerator





## Crowdsourcing

- "Crowdsourcing flips research planning from 'what is the best we can do with the resources we have to investigate our question?' to 'what is the best way to investigate our question, so that we can decide what resources to recruit?'" (Uhlmann et al., 2019, p. 713)
  - **Big-team science**
- Can crowdsource research questions, study plans, data collection, data analysis





## Crowdsourcing

- Horizontal distribution of research ownership, resources, and expertise
- Emphasis on conducting fewer, larger studies
  - Facilitates systematic replication, transparency, and sharing
  - Including conceptual replications to examine effect heterogeneity
- Democratizing research
  - Involving many and diverse researchers and participants
- Facilitates **investigation of effect heterogeneity** and identifying boundaries of effectiveness rather than main effects



## Collaborating with TED on Crowdsourced Research in Teacher Education

- Promote an inclusive and democratic approach to setting the agenda and conducting research on special education teacher preparation
  - Crowdsource teacher education research agenda
  - Collect longitudinal data with shared measures across sites to build a secondary data source for research and enhancing our practices
  - Use SERA to conduct large-scale, representative studies on teacher education practices
    - Unlike most SERA projects, **WE** are often the research sites
- Ultimately
  - Help improve our practices and provide us with comprehensive data to stand up and advocate for our field



## **Crowdsourcing for Teacher Educators**

• With all the competing "pulls" for our time & attention, what are some easy pickings that have meaningful outcomes?

## e.g.,

- measuring "Impact on Student Learning"
- Teacher Performance Assessments & other "data driven interventions" completed by candidates
- studying influence of common "practice-based learning opportunities"

## Harnessing Researchers to Improve PD

## Expertise in evidence-based practices

- Deep understanding of the latest research and best practices in special education
- Equipped to provide education that is rooted in proven methods and strategies

#### Understand state and local contexts

- Awareness of specific challenges and needs within local school systems
- Ability to tailor PD to address these unique local educational environments

#### Underutilized in PD

 Despite their expertise, special education researchers often have limited roles in mainstream PD





## Aletheia's Approach to PD in Special Education

- Crowdsource the PD Model
  - Engaging a wide range of experts to ensure the PD model is evidencebased and comprehensive
- Develop specific PD modules as a group and/ or individually
  - Ensure content up-to-date, relevant and address research to practice gap
- Implement a robust quality assurance process to maintain high quality
- Outreach to education community
  - Actively advertise and promote PD to schools, districts and educational organizations
  - Manage the business side of PD

## Unconferences (Budd et al., 2015)

- "Unconventional conferences"
- Unconferences are participant-oriented meetings with informal and flexible programs that emphasize collaborative work
- Can involve different formats, but minimize lecturestyle presentations and emphasize engagement and collaboration

- Help break down traditional barriers, expand professional networks, and foster ongoing collaborations
